### Lawn Care

- Would you believe that Mid-August through mid-September is the best time of year to plant grass seed? Longer, cooler nights and reduced weed seed competition give grass seedlings a better start toward establishment. See our coupon below for a great deal on grass seed!
- Use a starter fertilizer 10-10-20 when planting grass seed. Make sure the fertilizer doesn't contain herbicide, as seedling grasses are particularly vulnerable to damage. Even corn gluten meal, which is totally organic, will stop grass seeds from sprouting.

### Garden Tips:

- Don't let summer's heat discourage you from maintaining your gardens. Regular watering, weeding and harvesting (or removing faded flowers in flower gardens) will keep them productive through early autumn or later.
- Dig up and divide crowded iris beds that didn't bloom as well as they once did. Throw out the woody older center portions of rhizomes. Replant healthy, plump outer portions just below the soil surface. <http://tinyurl.com/28axw8m>
- Avoid blossom end rot in tomatoes by keeping an even supply of moisture in the soil.
- August is the time of year many birds are looking for winter feeding territories. To keep birds coming back to your feeders in any season check out <http://tinyurl.com/24msdmn>
- Too many zucchini? Donate extra squash, beans, carrots, tomatoes and even herbs, to local food banks. Call ahead to make sure they have facilities to keep the food fresh until it's used or given away.
